
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The Peapack Oval

MORRIS COUNTY PATRIOTIC COVERS

The American Civil War has provided collectors with many patriotic cachet covers. Thought the years I have been able to obtain a few patriotic covers from Morris County. What is surprising is how few I have been able to locate considering the county strongly supported the Union during the war.

A summary of Morris County's military contribution to the war effort can be found in "History of Morris County, New Jersey, 1739 – 1882." The book was originally published by W. W. Munsell & Co. The Morris County Historical Society reprinted it in 1973.




Figure 2 Boonton, NJ, Oct 9, cancellation (33 mm) with 7 bar grid killer, reverse has embossed white eagle with slogan "Union and Constitution" and red and blue flap edging. No cachet on front

Next to three of the illustrations of figures 2, 5 and 7 are smaller pictures. These represent embossed designs on the envelopes' sealing flaps. They are difficult to see, so I used Photoshop to "enhance" them so they are visible.




Figure 4 Morristown, NJ May 29 with 7 bar grid killer, large flag on staff cachet. There is a notation on the reverse that reads "Robert's military Discharge, Apr 23, 1861"






Figure 5 Morristown, NJ Aug 1, cancellation (33 mm) with 7 bar grid killer, reverse has embossed shield with slogan "Union" and red and blue flap edging. No cachet on front.






Figure 7 Boonton, NJ Nov 2, cancellation (33 mm) with 7 bar grid killer, reverse has embossed white eagle with slogan "Union and Constitution" and red and blue flap edging. No cachet on front.




Figure 8 Flanders, NJ Mar 22 manuscript cancel, flag on staff cachet with patriotic verse.

BLOOD'S DISPATCH: THE LAMBERTVILLE CONNECTION




Blood's Dispatch (15LU5) on a U9 government envelope mailed from Philadelphia ca.1855. Addressed to Mrs. E. Kochersperger, Care of John H. Anderson, Lambertville, N.J.

John H. Anderson owned and operated a general merchandise store at the corner of Union and Coryell Street in Lambertville. He also built the fine brick house at what is now #16 Coryell Street.

His son, John A. Anderson, at the age of nineteen in 1848, would soon enter the Engineering Department of the Belvidere & Delaware Railroad, retiring as Superintendent at Lambertville in 1886.

As a young man, John A. became quite proficient in new art Daguerreotype prophotogcess of raphy. The accompanying photo is one taken by John A. of his younger sister Kate at their Coryell Street home.



Kate Anderson attended the Oakland Institute at Norristown, Pa. and married Elbert Kochersperger at some point in the early 1850's. Her husband Elbert and his brother Charles had gone to work for Daniel O. Blood's City Dispatch service in 1846. Charles purchased the business when Blood died in 1855 and Elbert bought him out shortly before the Civil War.

Blood's Dispatch, under the direction of the Kocherspergers, became one of the largest private delivery services in the country, handling 6000 to 8000 letters a day and employing thirty-two carriers. The offices of the service were located on Chestnut Street and later on Fifth Street.

After a long fight with the Post Office, Congress declared the streets of all cities and towns to be post roads, which effectively put all city dispatch posts out of business.

Blood's Penny Post delivered its last mail on the morning of January 11, 1862. After the demise of his business, Elbert secured a position with the Philadelphia National Bank on Chestnut Street. As the corner card of this cover from his brother-in-law John A. Anderson in Lambertville indicates, John A. had become Superintendent of the Belvidere & Delaware Railroad in 1870.

THE PEAPACK OVAL: A FURTHER REVISION AND UPDATE

In the nearly 20 years since the publication of William C. Coles, Jr.'s *The Postal Markings of New Jersey Stampless Covers* in 1983, additional information has come to light concerning some of the scarce stampless cover markings. The Coles Book recorded only two examples of the Peapack oval with usages dated in 1842 and 1843. The tracing of the fleurons in the oval were depicted in the Coles Book with solid lines. Coles described this marking as "the most desirable of the New Jersey oval postmarks."

Shortly after publication of the Coles Book, David Petruzelli, writing in NJPH, attempted to correct the record as it was then known: (1) he reported the existence of three covers with the Peapack oval handstamp, namely, the ex-Joseph Herbert cover with an 1830 usage; the ex-Stephen Rich/Coles cover showing an 1842 usage as illustrated on page 36 of the Coles Book; and the ex-Edwin Mayer cover with an 1849 usage. Petruzelli, in addition to correcting the dates of usage, demonstrated that the fleurons in the oval were actually dotted in the handstamp and not solid lines. In a subsequent update appearing in NJPH, Coles revised the Peapack listing to reflect Petruzelli's research. Each of the original three recorded covers is illustrated below:




Figure 1: 1830 Usage




Figure 2: 1842 Usage

Petruzelli also noted the year date discrepancy appearing in the then current 1978 edition of the *American Stampless Cover Catalog*, which listed an unknown 1847 usage. Through the 1965 edition of the ASCC, a single usage of 1842 had been listed, the well-known Stephen Rich cover. However, in the 1971 edition of the ASCC, the listing was inexplicably changed to 1847. The erroneous 1847 single usage has been perpetuated through the fourth edition published in 1985 and the most recent fifth edition in 1997.

The record of reported covers stood at three until 1987 when the Austin Craig letter book was discovered in Ohio by a Midwestern postal history dealer. That letter book included correspondence from a Craig relative identified in the folded letters only as "M.C." Among the letters were three Peapack oval handstamps with July, August and September 1850 usages, respectively. Each of the three handstamped covers from the Austin Craig find are illustrated below.




Figure 4: July 24, 1850




Figure 5: August 28, 1850




Figure 6: September 21, 1850

The Craig find thus brought the total of recorded Peapack oval handstamps to six. However, the Austin Craig letter book also contained four manuscript Peapack town markings as illustrated below. The earliest usage was from August 1848, while the other three show January, February and July 1850 usages.




Figure 7: Manuscript - August 5, 1848




Figure 8: Manuscript - January 26, 1850

Note: The Craig Find letters all bear numbers, sometimes in parentheses, probably added later by a family member in possession of the letter book, to indicate the order of the letters.

These are not post office markings.




Figure 9: Manuscript - February 2, 1850




Figure 10: Manuscript- July 31, 1850

It is unusual for a post office to use both a handstamp and a manuscript town marking on a contemporaneous basis. Why were they used at the same time for almost two years? Surely the volume of mail at what was then a small farming village did not necessitate more than a single mail clerk on a given day postmarking the outgoing mail. This was not a situation in which the handstamp had worn out over a 22 year period or otherwise showed signs of deterioration. In fact, the heaviest period of contemporaneous handstamp and manuscript usage was 1850, the last reported year of the handstamp's usage! The latest reported example of the handstamp on September 21, 1850, *Figure 6*, shows a clear strike with all the letters and the dotted fleurons intact. Perhaps a reader has an explanation.

Over the last five years, three additional Peapack ovals have come to light. The first with a September 1849 usage is shown in *Figure 11* below.




Figure 12: February 28, 1828

The second, illustrated below as *Figure 12*, was sold in an eBay auction in October, 2001.⁸ The cover has a somewhat watery handstamp with a February 28, 1828 usage, sent unpaid for 18³4 cents (single letter rate 150-400 miles) to Auburn, N.Y. This folded letter currently represents the earliest recorded use of the Peapack oval handstamp.

The author, in the course of researching the Internet, located the third example, illustrated below as Figure~13.9 The letter, included on the website, confirms an 1828 usage.




Figure 13: March 14, 1828



In sum, at present, there are nine covers of record with the Peapack oval handstamp, the earliest in 1828 and the latest in 1850, accounting for a relatively long period of usage of at least 22 years. Both the Coles Book and the *ASCC* listings need to be revised to reflect this extended period of handstamp usage. The Coles Book recorded a manuscript usage in 1836, which was presumed to pre-date the handstamp's first appearance, then believed to be 1842. However, because the manuscript Peapack marking is now recorded during the last two years of the handstamp's usage from 1848 to 1850, it appears that both markings may have been used on a contemporaneous basis from as early as 1836 through 1850. The current census of both the handstamp and manuscript town markings are detailed in the chart that follows at the end of this article.

FIRST NJPHS AUCTION ON EBAY

The New Jersey Postal History Society, using the ID "NJPHS", ran its first eBay auctions on Oct. 6 & 7. Forty lots were listed with good results. Most items sold, and most had multiple bids. Those for which the reserve was not met all received more than one bid. Only 3 lots received no bids.

As would be expected, the New Jersey material which we posted was a bit more broad-ranged than that usually found at one time on eBay. On a week-to-week basis, most listings of N.J. Postal History items on eBay seem to be from the 1890's thru 1940's period, and seem to mostly be Doane cancels, 4-Bars, etc. Stampless, early stamped NJ covers, DPO's, ad covers, etc. are found, but not in large numbers. The NJPHS listing included a nice group of NJ stampless covers, several quite scarce DPO's on 19th century covers (Townsend Inlet, Brick Church), a couple of nice #11 NJ covers, a couple of ad covers (Asbury, Smithville), a railroad cover (NY -Som.&Easton), and several lots grouped by subject, as well as some early to mid 20th century NJ items.

Overall the quality of material was very good. The bulk of the stampless covers were clean with many having nice strikes, including an example of the DPO Mansfield. There was also one example each of the Middletown Point, Monmouth Co., and of the Cape Island in a yellowish orange color. The Everittstown and Hudson #11 covers were both of very good quality, and their price realizations reflected that. A lot of 6 DPO's & Doanes included a great example of the Prospertown Doane with a Hornerstown steel cancel on the same card(!). There was an unusual Princeton straightline canceling a #300 on cover. And, there was, of course, the requisite lot of 60+ mostly 19th century NJ towns. All in all, consigners made an effort to present good material.

The consigners have expressed satisfaction with the sales of their material. Also, although I haven't investigated it, I would like to point out that I've heard that average eBay sales are 40%, meaning that about 40% of the items listed actually sell (there are a number of factors which can cause this to vary from week to week, or even day to day). Our auction resulted in slightly more than 75% of the items selling. When also taking into consideration the fact that many of the items in the society's previous floor and mail bid auctions did not sell, the eBay auction can be viewed as quite encouraging. I'd also like to point out that subsequent to shipping the lots, I received a number of e-mails from buyers saying how pleased they were with the material they bought. All in all, with most lots selling with multiple bids, and with both buyers and consigners expressing satisfaction, the auction can be viewed as a success.

We would like to try this again in January. I can comfortably handle about 50 lots per auction. Those who would like to consign, therefore don't necessarily have to send in large groupings. A few items is fine. I would like to try and have all material by the first week in January. For those who are new to eBay, please refer to the article in the July 2002 NJPH for a simple overview of how eBay works, and how we are trying to approach our eBay auctions. See the eBay website or the July NJPH for a more complete listing of fees).

On the next pages is a table showing the results of the auction. The table is taken directly from the seller's completed items page, as can be found through the search engine on the eBay website, and at the right side has an added column showing the number of bids and individual bidders for each of the items we listed. The number in the left column is the eBay item number. The next column over gives the full title for each item as it appeared on eBay's "U.S. Postal History" category page. Next to that is given the eBay ID of the high bidder with the feedback number in parentheses, followed by the starting price or minimum bid for each item along with an indication of each item which had a reserve. Note that we maintain a minimum bid, or a reserve of \$9.99 per item. With items that have a reserve, the consigner can start with as small a minimum as they like (even one cent) - the item is not sold until it meets the reserve. The second column from the right shows the ending price or selling price for each item.

Thanks again to all who participated in the first NJPHS eBay auction.

These auctions benefit the Society in many ways: it disperses more New Jersey material and hopefully will increase the interest of others in our specialty. A membership application is sent to all winners. While the sellers benefit from having their material sold, the Society benefits by earning 5% for our treasury. And we all benefit by having more material to bid on. We highly recommend that members log on in January and see if there is not something of interest that you might bid on. The only disappointment in this past auction was the apparent lack of bids from NJPHS members.



[The following is part of an exhibit which was shown at the recent APS Atlantic City Show by Jim Mason in the Non-Competitive category. We thought members of the Society would enjoy a look.]

Atlantic City has had a post office for 148 years since 1854, when a railroad, the Camden and Atlantic, was completed across New Jersey from the Delaware River to its ocean terminus in the city, and the city was incorporated and named. The present post office is its eleventh one, competed during the years of the great depression in 1937.

Postal history-wise,

Atlantic City probably is richer than any other city of similar size. What other city of about 40,000 people can claim the variety of machine cancels, slogan cancels, special cancels, F.D.C.s, first flights, carriers, R.P.O.s, precancels, etc.?



The above card authorized by an act of Congress on May 10, 1898 contributed to the postcard craze of the early twentieth century.








